The Aims of the Linking Programme are:

- To develop and deepen children and young people's knowledge and - understanding of identity/ies, diversity, equality and community.
- To develop skills of enquiry, critical thinking, reflection and communication.
- To develop trust, empathy, awareness and respect.
- To provide opportunities for children and young people to meet, build relationships, work together and contribute to the wider community.
- To provide opportunities for adults who work with children and young people to share good practice, increase understanding of the issues of identity and community in their districts and to broaden perspectives.

The Linking Project is structured around Four Key Questions:

- Who am I? – exploring identity, including faith, as part of multiple identity
- Who are we? – celebrating diversity, including similarity and difference
- Where do we live? – promoting community and a sense of belonging for all: locally; nationally; globally
- How do we all live together? – championing equality, challenging prejudice in all its forms and promoting active citizenship

This academic year we were successful in linking over 30 classes from 23 different schools, allowing over 800 children to develop and sustain relationships. We provide support throughout the project including CPD for staff, provision of fantastic resources and a neutral visit at a neutral venue facilitated by Burnley Youth Theatre.

We are currently recruiting schools for our next cohort to begin in the autumn term and for the first time will deliver a community link between parents from different schools and also welcome expressions of interest from secondary schools and colleges. The subsidised cost for schools is £250 per school. 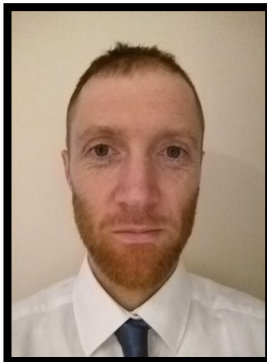

She attends college in Preston full time, but in her spare time she works hard translating for members of the Romanian community with the Lancashire Ethnic Minority, Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Achievement Service and for Lancashire Police.

"Without Dayanna's help" Lisa Young, a community worker and teaching assistant working for the Lancashire EMGRTAS told us "I would really have struggled in the vital work that I do ensuring that Romanian heritage children, young people and families are able to access education and other vital services. Dayanna is selfless, reliable, caring and incredibly hardworking, and I'm so excited for her being nominated for this award to recognise all of her hard work."

Dayanna didn't win the young citizen award, but she was recognised for her hard work, and received a highly commended award, which is a very respectable achievement in itself. Dayanna was pleased that her hard work has been acknowledged by The High Sheriff of Lancashire, and The Lancashire Ethnic Minority, Gypsy, Roma and Traveller Achievement Service would like to extend our congratulations and gratitude to this exceptional young person!

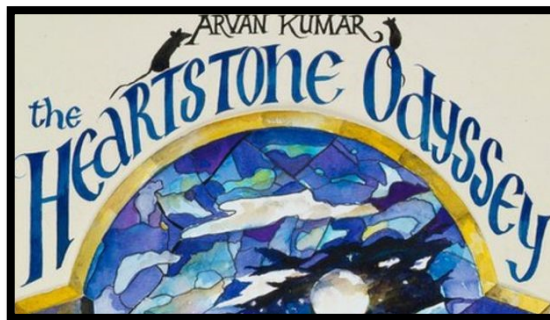

Heartstone Odyssey - Preston

We are working with Preston City Council, the Racial Equality Council (REC) and Lancs Constabulary to bring the Heartstone Odyssey Project to Preston.

We hope to recruit 10 schools from the Preston area to take part. Working with Years 5,6 and 7 the project will be led by Heartstone, a non-profit national voluntary organisation and will encourage learners to see past prejudice and celebrate difference.



Centred on Heartstone's fictional story, The Heartstone Odyssey, the project will:

- promote understanding of different nationalities, cultures & backgrounds,
- challenge prejudice, intolerance and explore hate crimes
- develop literacy, communication and critical thinking skills

Schools are asked to send in expressions of interest to begin the project in the autumn term. Each school will be provided with CPD for staff, FREE Heartstone books and resources and will culminate in a celebratory event to be held in the summer term.

Prevent for Schools

Prevent is part of the government counter-terrorism strategy (CONTEST) and is designed to tackle the problem of terrorism at its roots, preventing people from supporting terrorism or becoming involved in terrorism themselves.

The police are aware that incidents of terrorist and pre-terrorist activity are increasing across the county, particularly with regard to far-right inspired hate crime and hate speech. With this in mind it is essential that we are all vigilant for early signs of radicalisation among the children, young people and families that we work with and are confident in how to respond.

Members of our team are now accredited by the Home Office to deliver FREE Prevent briefings and updates for schools. The briefings will:

- Provide an understanding of the Prevent strategy and your role within it
- The ability to use existing expertise and professional judgment to recognise the vulnerable individuals who may need support
- Local safeguarding and referral mechanisms and people to contact for further help and advice

Well done to Chorley Astley Park School who achieved the Lancashire Equality Mark

Astley Park School, a special school for pupils aged 4 to 16 years, have used the Lancashire Equality Mark to support them in providing Equality of Opportunity for all members for the school community whatever their disability, age, gender, race, nationality, religion, marital status, maternity, sexual orientation or background.

The school have embedded equalities fully into their practice by establishing an Equality working party, including a strong link with their governors and, on visiting the school, this proved a particularly effective way of working towards the mark. At the accreditation visit, we got the opportunity to meet the school council and hear about all they have been doing in school. They had training for staff and reflected on their practice in a number of areas. Some of actions they took were:

- Celebrating LGBT History Month and World Religion Day
- Assemblies focusing on facilitating discussion and facilitating understanding to allow the children and young people to celebrate and embrace diversity
- Staff training on PREVENT, LGBT equality, EKLAN (speech and language)

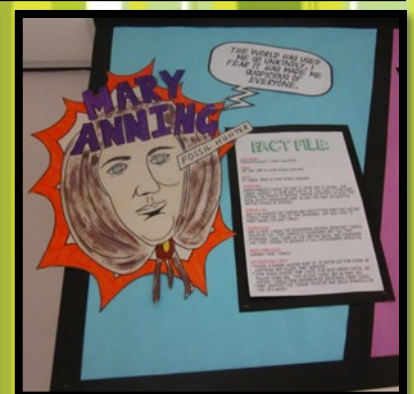
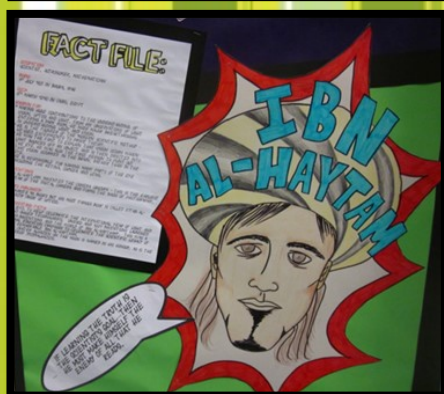
The process of working towards the Equality Mark supported them achieving their recently awarded Ofsted 'outstanding' status.



Congratulations to Marsden Community Primary School – 3 badges in 1 day!

Marsden Community Primary achieved three of the equality mark badges – Race, Gender and Disability - in one day. An interesting way they support their pupils to embrace diversity and see how people could achieve from any background was the school's great use of inspirational role models. Incorporated into lessons and displayed around the school were role models from many spheres of life, such as art, sports and science. These role models were from a wide variety of backgrounds and encourage the children to have aspirations and believe all can achieve.

Speaking to the Year 6 pupils, we could hear about changes taking place in pupils' attitudes through the work the school had been doing. For example, we heard one of the boys coming to the conclusion that "there are no boys' jobs or girls' jobs". It was amazing to see these attitudes shifting!
