The interpolated or sketched Contour Lines are thus shown

The Altitudes are above the mean level of the Sea, as Liverpool.  
The Contour altitudes are written thus 200  
All other altitudes along roads, and to Trig. Stations, obtained by Spirit Levelling are written thus 300, the dot showing the spot whose altitude is given.  
The altitudes with the letters B.M. marked & against them, refer to marks made on Buildings, Walls, Millstones, &c.  
The altitudes at the Trig. Stations are given of the surface of the ground, & also of the upper side of the centre stone marking the Station.
