## ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984 LANCASHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

(BENTINCK ROAD, HIGHBURY ROAD WEST AND TODMORDEN ROAD, LYTHAM ST ANNES, FYLDE BOROUGH) (ONE WAY, MANDATORY CYCLE LANE AND PROHIBITION OF ENTRY) ORDER 2024

**NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN** that on 16 October 2024 Lancashire County Council made the above Traffic Regulation Order under Sections 1, 2 and 4 to the **Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984**, as amended, the effect of which will be to:

- 1. Introduce one way traffic in Todmorden Road, Lytham St Annes, from a point 81.5 metres north east of its centreline junction with North Promenade to its junction with Clifton Drive North, south west to north east.
- 2. Introduce a prohibition of entry except pedal cycles in Bentinck Road, Lytham St Annes, entry into Bentinck Road to be prohibited at its junction with North Promenade.
- 3. Introduce a mandatory contra-flow cycle lane in Todmorden Road, Lytham St Annes, from its junction with Clifton Drive North for a distance of 32 metres in a south westerly direction.
- 4. Introduce a mandatory with-flow cycle lane in Highbury Road West, Lytham St Annes, from a point 50 metres north east of its junction with the centreline of Clifton Drive North for a distance of 32 metres in a south westerly direction.

This Order will come into force on the 28 October 2024.
