Something to do this week! Review your security



There is a huge variety of premises used for childcare; including childminders in domestic homes, small nurseries or out of school clubs in community centres and schools and larger settings in their own buildings. Whatever your set up, the Early Years Statutory Framework is

clear about providers responsibilities around the security of their premises.

- Children do not leave the premises unsupervised
- They take all reasonable steps to prevent unauthorised persons entering the premises and have an agreed procedure for checking the identity of visitors
- They consider what additional measures are necessary when children stay overnight

The Childcare Register also states:

 make sure that no child can leave the premises, and no one can enter the premises, without someone who is providing childcare being aware

These questions will help you to reflect on how you are keeping your premises secure:

- Do parents and carers understand your systems when dropping off and collecting their child and don't compromise security eg. Not to hold the door open for other?
- Childminders do your family members support you by closing doors and gates etc?
- Group care are staff deployed to support the security of the premises eg. are they able to open the door to parents and monitor gates in outside areas?
- Do risk assessments identify doors, gates and boundaries as things that need to be checked regularly?
- Shared premises do you ensure that other users of the premises cannot enter the part of the premises where children are being cared for?
- Are fire exits clear of obstacles and open easily from inside?

Well Done



This week we are shouting a magnificent Wednesday Well Done to three Childminders in Lancashire who have recently has their Ofsted inspection reports published!

Elaine Hodgson from Kirkham is thrilled with her inspection outcome. Elaine shared that she was dreading Ofsted coming but it was all good. Elaine showed her safeguarding file, training certificates and the Communication and Language tool kit. The inspector noted the positive relationships Elaine has with her children and liked the fact that she asks the parents to supply photographs of important people in the child's life and makes these into an album that is freely available for the child to look at. Her reports notes-

'The childminder is a positive role model and she has high expectations of children. For instance, she reminds children to use good manners. The childminder teaches children about different emotions as they share books together. 'Elaine's Top tips: Have notes about children's progress, to hand to share with the inspector in case your mind goes blank when asked ..And don't worry!

Michelle Livingstone from Carnforth shared that she also has a positive inspection experience. Michelle reports that the inspector really put her and the children at ease. As well as the closing feedback, the inspector gave Michelle positive feedback throughout the day, commenting on children's levels of independence and resilience at snack time as they persevered to spread their own butter on their toast. In her report the inspector notes: 'Partnerships with parents are a real strength. The childminder shares meaningful information every day and gives ideas to parents about how they can support learning at home. Parents are very complimentary about the care their children receive. They say that the childminder 'gives incredible care' and children 'love going. 'Michelle's top tip is not to focus too much on the activity that you forget the importance of the day-to-day interactions, as these matter just as much if not more.

and was more relaxed than her previous ones. The inspector asked about children's next steps and wanted to look at a 2 year progress check and DBS, safeguarding and first aid certificates. She also asked to see family members DBS certificates. Dawn was asked how she keeps her knowledge updated through professional development opportunities. In her report her inspector noted – 'The childminder has developed an ambitious curriculum and provides rich experiences to support children's learning across all areas. She instils values of compassion and respect for one another. The childminder interacts with children very well to help them to develop their imaginations and confidence.'



Asthma and Anaphylaxis recommendations

The National Child Mortality Database (NCMD) recommendations around child deaths from asthma and anaphylaxis has recently been published and are attached for further information.

There were 54 child deaths due to asthma between April 2019 and March 2023. Some themes associated with these deaths were: smoking by family members, pets in the house and allergies.

There were 19 child deaths due to anaphylaxis between the same period. The most common allergen that triggered fatal anaphylaxis was milk.

Health colleagues recommend multi agency partners who have regular contact with children and young people complete a free E-learning course to enhance knowledge and confidence. Here is the link to the course
