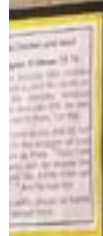

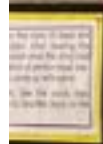

The first pillar of Islam is the Shahadah (Declaration of Faith). It is the statement of belief that there is only one God - Allah.

The second pillar of Islam is the prayer (Salat). It is the act of worshiping Allah five times a day.

The third pillar of Islam is the fasting (Sawm). It is the act of abstaining from food and drink during the month of Ramadan.

The fourth pillar of Islam is the giving of charity (Zakat). It is the act of giving a portion of one's wealth to the poor and needy.

The fifth pillar of Islam is the pilgrimage (Hajj). It is the act of traveling to Mecca to perform the Hajj.

THE FIVE PILLARS OF ISLAM

Islam is about the most popular religion in the world. It has over 1.5 billion followers.

However, unlike other religions, Islam is not a belief system. It is a way of life. It is a religion that is based on the teachings of the Prophet Muhammad (peace be upon him).

There are five pillars of Islam. They are:

1. The Shahadah (Declaration of Faith)
2. The Salat (Prayer)
3. The Sawm (Fasting)
4. The Zakat (Charity)
5. The Hajj (Pilgrimage)

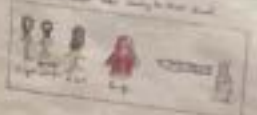

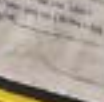

After looking at the pictures and having a discussion the children were told that the people in the images were in fact British and they are Muslims which means they follow the religion of Islam. The children in KS1 are very good at coming up with enquiry questions that we can use to investigate during our RE units of work and this unit was no exception. Following the discussion the children came up with the following enquiry questions which we then used to structure our sessions going forward. As the children found out an answer to their question they then recorded it in their class Big Book.

Why would people laugh at someone with a hijab? (Amna) ^{They might not understand} Like in the story - The Gravedigger.

Afrah was introduced to the class as a new pupil at our school. She attended sessions wearing her uniform along with her book bag. Each week she brought some different things to share in her bag. For example, one week she brought a hijab and the book *The Proudest Blue*. The children loved the story and it helped them begin to understand how special the hijab is to Muslim women and girls. Afrah shared that her hijab is red and she wears it on special occasions but when she is older she will start to wear it all of the time.



In the following weeks, Afrah brought a range of artefacts including a copy of the Qur'an, a topi, some prayer beads, some photos of the mosque etc. We also used video clips from BBC Schools to show children a mosque and why it is a special place of worship.

Using Afrah in this way really made the learning so much more powerful. The children showed respect for Afrah and were concerned about her getting home safely or her being alone in class. One child was even concerned that Afrah didn't have her name on her bag so wrote this on for her along with the class name.



By treating her as a real person the children built a relationship with her and were keen to find out what she had brought to share with them each week.

Overall this was a huge success and the children remembered more and got more involved with the learning than in previous units of work. This is something we are now looking to build on by introducing another persona doll for a different religion.

In EYFS, we introduced Afrah later in the year during the unit of work on prayer. The children had started the unit by learning about prayer being a form of communication with God. We then brought Afrah in as a visitor from the Busy Bees class. We started by telling the children all about her as a person before Afrah then shared some artefacts linked to prayer in Islam.

The children in Nursery and Reception were enthralled and listened so well to what Afrah had to share. One little girl in Reception got very excited when she realised that Afrah and the things she was sharing were from her daddy's religion. She then told us what the artefacts were and how they were used. The pupil then went on to share about visiting the Mosque and about her daddy performing Wudhu. She also told the class how her daddy was fasting at the moment and was looking forward to breaking his fast soon with his favourite meal.

The children loved listening to their classmate share their experiences and all had fantastic questions.

The children really enjoyed these sessions and remembered so much too!

Using the persona doll in both classes create a safe space for the children to explore, enquire and engage in discussions about Islam. This is definitely something that we now wish to build on going forwards.

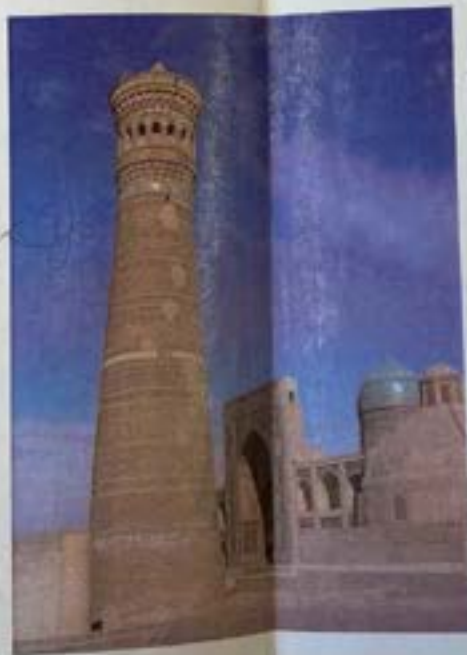
The Qiblah Wall faces Mecca.

THE 5 PILLARS OF ISLAM.

The five Pillars of Islam are:

- 1) The Great Shahadah (Declaration of Faith)
- 2) Pray 5 times a day
- 3) Fasting (only during the month of Ramadan)
- 4) Each year give money to charity 
- 5) Hajj

The 5 Pillars of Islam are important to Muslims because so if they follow they will live a good life according to Islam. It also makes the worship in their God stronger.



Did you know?

- Fasting is when Muslims (type of religion) don't eat or drink during day light hours so they focus more on praying and have a better relation ship with their God.
- There is no specific order as to ~~feeling~~ fulfilling the five pillars of Islam as all are equally important.



- Carrying out the 5 pillars demonstrates that the Muslims is putting their faith first instead of fitting it around your schedule.



- Under Muslim women have to wear head dresses so they don't show their body to their God.

FIVE PILLERS OF ISLAM.

I was so happy, yet nervous.

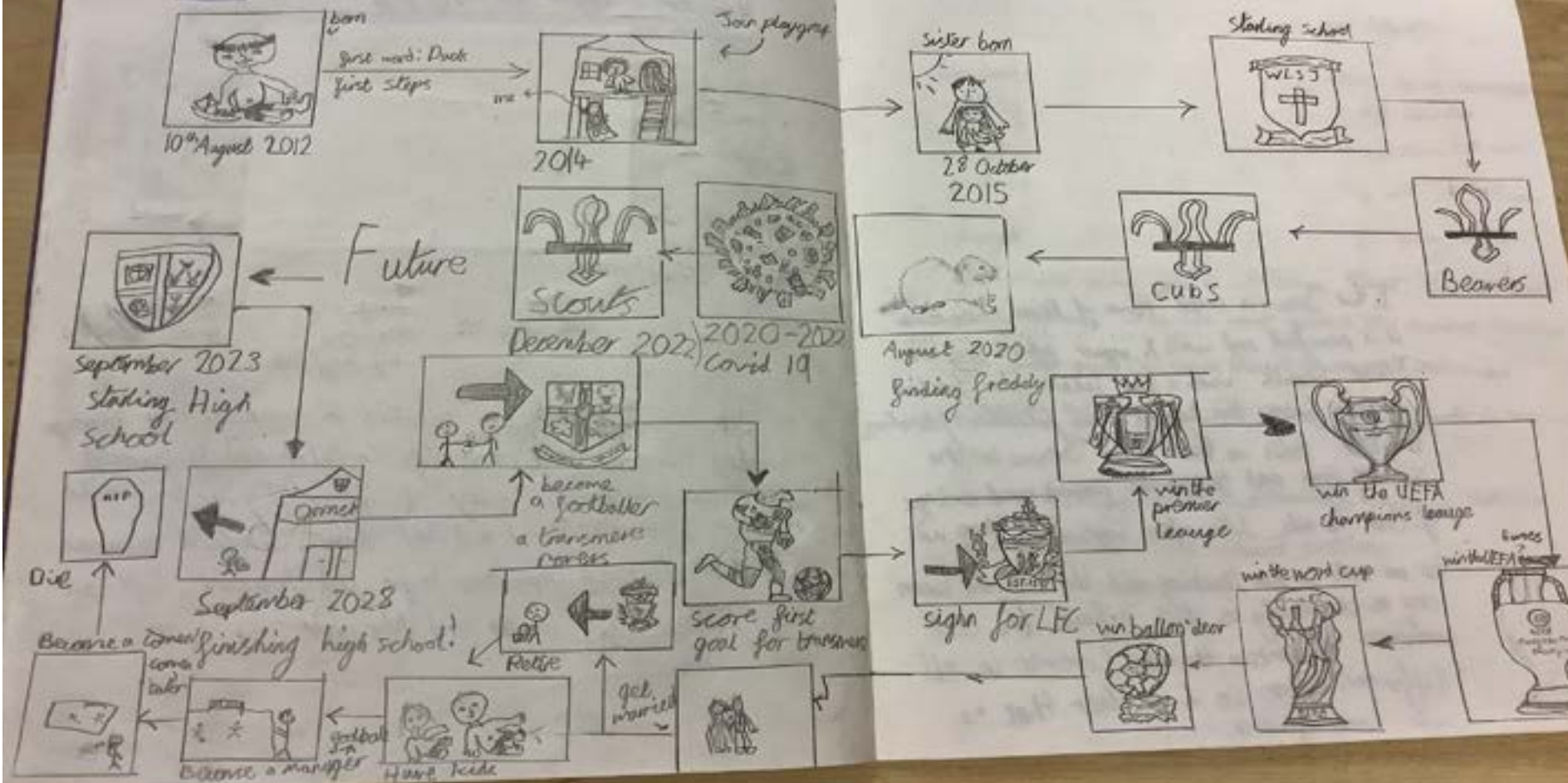
The years saving had paid off.
